It was a worrying time for all when Helen was in hospital and in care during the COVID 19 Pandemic. We are thankful for Helen's recovery and look forward to seeing her at future fundraising events — whenever they occur.

A Thank You

Counselling Continues at Joseph's Corner

The COVID19 Pandemic is continuing to have a significant impact on Joseph's Corner but we are trying to continue operating. The sad reality is that Government and community responses to the COVID 19 Pandemic have not diminished or lessened the harm done to families through substance abuse by a family member.

Throughout the COVID 19 Pandemic people have continued to approach Joseph's Corner for assistance. Our Counsellors, including the Counsellors on placement from the Universities, have to date been able to take on new clients as well as continuing to assist existing clients.

When the first set of restrictions were imposed by Governments as a result of the COVID 19 Pandemic it was clear that our fundraising would suffer a dramatic decline this year. The Board of Joseph's Corner made the decision to reduce expenditure where necessary so as to ensure the ongoing viability of Joseph's Corner.

One of the items of expenditure which was cut was the engagement as a contractor of a Supervisor for the Counsellors. As the Counsellors have continued to see clients it has become imperative that we provide the professional Supervision that they need. Whilst the Counsellors are receiving Jobkeeper payments we are able to have the Counsellors continue working and assisting clients. However, the Supervisor position was not covered by Jobkeeper and in order to again engage a Supervisor for the Counsellors then Joseph's Corner will have to pay for that work.

Our current financial position is such that we need assistance to ensure that we can pay the Supervisor for the Counsellors. As with everyone who does paid work for Joseph's Corner the Supervisor for the Counsellors has done so at a modest rate.

We have been paying \$528 per month to the Supervisor for the Counsellors. This amount provides us with a fortnightly supervision session where the Supervisor has a 1 hour one on one meeting with each Counsellor. It is clear that this is an ongoing need that will need to be funded for quite some time.
